The International IPS Learning Community

The IPS Learning Community provides support to leaders in states, countries, regions, and programs as they develop, improve, and sustain IPS services. Members of the learning community share their experiences, program data, and lessons learned with each other. The goal is to expand IPS and provide excellent services so that as many people as possible have jobs that they enjoy.

The IPS Learning Community has evolved over the last eighteen years, starting with three sites in 2001. Currently, the community includes 21 U.S. states, the District of Columbia, Alameda County (California), Broward County (Florida), and six countries/regions outside the U.S.: Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, New Zealand, England, and Montreal, Canada.

IPS program supervisors in the Learning Community share simple program data on a quarterly basis. By doing so, they are able to compare their program outcomes with hundreds of other programs in the U.S. And as supervisors pose questions to the IPS Center, researchers are sometimes able to investigate and provide answers. For example, some IPS supervisors in rural/frontier areas wondered if it is harder to help people find jobs in those types of locations. Researchers used data from Learning Community programs to show there was no significant difference in outcomes between rural and urban areas.
